

FUNCTIONAL VS. SPIRITUAL LIFE

Functional:

- Driven by ambition, need for success, and/ or a need to fit in.
- Live under the common wisdom of the culture, society, and trends.
- Focused on quantities of life—how much do I have, how well have I done, how much influence do I have, etc...?
- Struggle to find a deeper identity and a sense of deeper meaning and purpose in life.

Spiritual/Mystical:

- Driven by aspiration and inspiration—for a need to fit with God's purpose and call.
- Live according to spiritual wisdom that arises from scripture, prayer, and a deeper knowing
- Focused on qualities of life—how well do I live, how well am I loving others, how much do I integrate God into my life, etc...?
- Are always seeking a deeper identity and that which brings meaning and purpose to life such as love, faith, joy, beauty...

THE FOUR DIMENSIONS OF LIFE

Spiritual Dimension (transcendent)

Aspiring to connect with God and openness to God's inspiration

Mental Dimension (functional)

How we function in life~our organizing planning, imagining, expecting, thinking, scheduling


Physical Dimension (vital)



We structure our lives so that our connection with God grows through both solitude and relationships




Physical
