
How can you help?

Facts for Families

Sponsorship Program

Since 1997 Westminster members have lovingly supported La Croix students. Since then, neighbors and friends of Westminster have begun sharing in this care and support. For \$240 annually, a child receives a quality education, a uniform, and a daily meal. Collectively, our efforts allow us to support over 100 children.

The Clinic at La Croix

In 1998, George King, along with several members of the Thomas Presbyterian and Newlonsburg Presbyterian Churches, participated in the construction of the Clinic at La Croix. As of 2009, the land has a brand new maternity ward, a residence for doctors and nurses, and lush green farm land where fruit trees, grains, rabbits, and fish grow. Because of this, very little malnutrition and fewer of the several cases of disease that dominated this region 11 years ago are seen. There is a full time dentist at the clinic.

Femmes De La Croix Scarf Project

This project was started in 2007 and has taught young women — both mission staff and high school students — how to paint silk scarves. Giving these women a means to earn a living and thereby develop independence has been a significant part of this project.

Over a six-moth period, 400 scarves were produced and then sold in Pittsburgh. All but \$2 per scarf goes to fund education for girls at the La Croix New Testament Mission Schools.
